Warrant For Town Meeting.

To Joseph W. Merrill, a Constable of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Falmouth, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in town, on the second day of March, 1891, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, and School Committee.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and repairs of roads and bridges and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see what method the town will adopt to repair the highways for the ensuing year.

Eighth. To see what the town will allow per hour for the labor of men, horses, and oxen on the highway.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more, on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Tenth. To see if the town will accept the bounds of road leading from the Foreside Road to Foster's Cove, so called, laid out by Selectmen.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors, as selected by the municipal officers.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to allow C. P. Huston to draw his proportionate part of school money of 1890 and 1891, from Dist. No. 8 and carry to Dis. No. 7.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to purchase a hearse and build a hearse house, and raise money for the same.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will exempt Mary S. Merrill from highway tax.

Fifteenth. To see what action the town will take to protect its clamming interests, and make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to build horse sheds for the accommodation of Town Officers, on Town House lot, and raise money for the same.

Seventeenth. To see what action the town will take in regard to the time of settlement of taxes.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists, at the Town Office at eight o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

There is at present one inmate at the Almshouse, Lydia Allen. The poor have received good care, and we find the house and barn have received good attention. The farm has furnished thirty-one meals and eleven nights lodging to tramps.

An inventory of stock, produce and groceries on farm Feb. 12, 1891: 5 cows, 1 horse, 3 swine, 28 hens, 10 ½ tons good hay, 2 tons fresh hay, 2½ tons bedding, 12 pounds butter, 3 gallons kerosene oil, 23 pounds lard, 15 pounds sugar, ½ pound tea, 1½ gallons molasses, 10 pounds soap, 1 bag salt, ½ bushel apples, ½ bushel beans, ½ bbl. pork, 4 bushels potatoes, ½ bbl. turnips, ½ bushel beets, 210 pounds middlings,

bushels meal, 3 bushels oats, 2 bushels corn, 1 bushel wheat, 1 bushel barley, ½ bushel cracked corn, 30 pounds grass seeds.

An ice house 13x19 has been built by Mr. Lord. The lumber for same was cut on town lot, for which he has received no credit in our account. List of farming tools and household furniture on file in town office.

SCHOOL REPORT

Fellow Citizens of Falmouth:

Another school year has passed and in accordance with the requirements of law your committee respectfully submit the annual report of the condition, progress and needs of our schools.

At the beginning of the year we found increased labor and responsibility owing to the new law in regard to text books.

After careful research and thorough examination of the many different publications, we selected those which in our judgment were best adapted to our schools; and it is with pleasure that we can report a decided improvement in their condition as a direct result of the "free text book" law, which took effect at the opening of the fall terms. The schools have been supplied, and we have on hand, for future use, books which at cost are worth one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125).

Neat and substantial cases were provided and books carefully packed in them while the schools are not in session. The teachers, with two exceptions, have kept careful record of books loaned, also condition when returned, and when any book has been lost or destroyed, have reported. They have sought to instil into the minds of the scholars a respect for the property of others instrusted to their keeping. The scholars have shown a commendable pride in the care of books loaned them, and in almost every instance have returned them in excellent condition. The advantages claimed for the law are be-

ing fully realized, still we must not rest here and expect new and improved textbooks and appliances to be used as substitutes for hard study. No royal road has been found that leads to success in any department or field of useful knowledge. scholarship many of our pupils take high rank and well merit all that is in the power of the parents and citizens to give. The needs of our schools cannot all be met and supplied by our liberal appropriations, and in view of the evils which threaten our country whose "government is of the people, for the people, and BY the people," and the fact that the children of to-day are the men and women of to-morrow, we will emphasize but one—Discipline. Itself an educator, its lack growing more and more apparent. Disregard of authority, if indulged, becomes a habit, and we see fearful illustrations of this fact in the family, the school, and the nation. The object of school discipline is twofold: School vices, such as idleness, disorderly conduct in and around the school room, and rudeness of speech or act in the intercourse of every day life, are to be prevented or cured; and school virtues, as respect to all, regularity in attendance, obedience, truthfulness, diligence, kindness, neatness, and thoroughness in lessons are to be cultivated, not only to promote the good of the school, but for their influence in forming habits and teaching that the highest value is character, not money, nor place, nor power. cure this end requires the combined influence of parent, teacher and citizen. If we are loyal to this need our boys and girls will enter upon their life work with high purposes, with an unshaken belief that it is far nobler to live uprightly than to "fare sumptuously." Then, and not till then, will the evils, national and social, which threaten our institutions, (we may say, our government) slowly, perhaps, but surely, be dispelled; and every boy and girl shall not only make intelligent, but patriotic, and rirtuous citizens.
